Proposed Policies to Help Vulnerable Youth

his spring, Homeless Children's Education Fund hosted a Homeless Youth Policy Breakfast to explore ways to amplify voices and mitigate the circumstances of these young adults. Rodd Monts, Director of State Policy for School House Connection provided an overview of legislation now under consideration in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. Monts said, "These bills would reduce barriers youth often face in accessing vital documents and critical supports needed for self-sufficiency, as well as to navigate successfully through higher education so that they can obtain a degree and thrive as adults."

► HB 127 - Drivers Licenses for Youth Experiencing Homelessness

Sponsor: Erie County Rep. Ryan Bizzarro

Would waive the fees for youth identified as homeless by a state agency and permit these children to use a shelter or school address as a temporary address; however, the child must be enrolled in an education program to receive the waived fee.

► HB 729 - Post-Secondary Help for Homeless Students

Sponsor: Berks County Rep. Mark Rozzi

Would require all institutions of higher learning to provide homeless and foster youth priority for oncampus housing and to develop plans for access to housing resources in between semesters and during breaks, if such accommodations are offered for the student body. It would require institutions of higher education to provide a liaison who would identify services and financial aid available for current and formerly homeless students.

► HB 730 - Homeless Minor's Ability to Contract for Services

Sponsor: Berks County Rep. Mark Rozzi

Would allow 16- and 17-year-olds to apply to high school or post-secondary schools, as well as contract for a variety of services including shelter and housing, employment, loans, and bank accounts. Further, the legislation would provide immunity to providers who have reason to believe the minor would incur harm if returned immediately to the home of the parent, the provider is unable to locate a parent, or the minor refuses to disclose contact information.

► HB 1175 - Pilot Program -Support for Homeless Students in Higher Education

Sponsor: Chester County Rep. Melissa Shusterman

Would provide for a pilot program at six geographically dispersed schools - four community colleges and two PASSHE institutions to assist students experiencing homelessness. The pilot program would ensure that homeless students have access to safe housing, food, laundry, technology, and other services so that they can focus on completing their education. Schools participating in the program would also be tasked with providing feedback on the program to recommend future legislation.

oing or returning to school can be stressful for children and teens, especially those with mental health issues or who have been exposed to trauma. Since the pandemic, mental health issues have spiked. National statistics show that 70% of teens suffer from loneliness. More than 40% of teens report feeling persistently sad or hopeless, and suicide rates among 10- to 24-yearolds increased by 57% between 2007 and 2018. Experts offer a few tips to get the year off to a good start with practices that bring security and stability into their lives.
