and support that will lead to self-sufficiency.

- ▶ Angels' Place Implements holistic programs for single parents and their children up to age 5 to create stability and reduce the likelihood that they will become homeless while providing the children with accredited early childhood education.
- ➤ **Art Expression** artists collaborate with five shelters to present workshops that teach children and their parents living in shelters coping and problem-solving skills and work to build their self-confidence.
- ▶ Beverly's Birthdays, believing that all children are worth celebrating, provides birthday cheer in shelters for children experiencing homelessness.

▶ Big Brothers Big Sisters

provides guidance and educational opportunities to high school students experiencing homelessness through one-on-one mentorship and post-secondary preparation classes.

▶ Bridge to the Mountains

arranges safe, emergency shelter to families with children and youth who would otherwise be unhoused.

► Catapult provides shelter,

education, and support for single, young parents with children under the age of 3 who are homeless, helping them achieve self-sufficiency.

- ▶ Duquesne University School
- **of Nursing** in support of its annual symposium that addresses issues vulnerable populations face. This year's focus was on assisting formerly incarcerated individuals.

- ▶ East End Cooperative Ministry provides enriching experience and diversionary activities during out-ofschool time that enable children to continue learning and see a brighter
- ▶ Familylinks offers critical financial assistance to families experiencing homelessness, transitioning to temporary or new permanent housing, or who are in imminent danger of homelessness to help them secure temporary or permanent housing.
- ➤ Goodwill of Southwestern PA
 works to prevent homelessness
 or decrease the time spent as
 homeless by providing supportive
 housing to families with children by
 providing services tailored to the
 needs of individual clients.
- ► **Grantmakers in Health** is a network of national foundations for which PCGF is a local funding partner.
- ► Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank works to ensure that anyone who needs a healthy meal can receive one.
- ► HEARTH supports families with children who are experiencing homelessness as victims of domestic violence or other traumas by providing mental health care, case management, transportation, and basic needs.
- ► Homeless Children's Education Fund in support of Winnie's Wagon, a mobile unit that provides services for the hard-to-reach homeless children who may not be staying in shelters or attending formal school regularly.
- ► **Jeremiah's Place** provides free emergency childcare for children ages birth to age 6.



Tickets for Kids enables children experiencing homelessness and living in shelters to enjoy cultural events and activities.

- ▶ Jubilee Association offers a variety of services through its Preventing Homelessness Program that includes financial support for mortgage, rental, and utility payments to help families avoid eviction and provides such supportive services as counseling and teaching job readiness skills.
- b Light of Life works to prevent homelessness and provide stability in the lives of the women with children by providing a continuum of care that includes addiction recovery, mental health care, and intensive case management.
- ► Serenity Living Transitional
 Home (SLTH) works to prevent
 homelessness in youth and young
 adults by providing transitional
 housing and supportive services
 to those who were homeless.
 SLTH also provides non-residential
 services for those who have
 experienced trauma that could
 derail their lives.
- Sojourner House supports mothers who are in recovery by keeping families together and by providing a safe haven to help keep them from slipping back into homelessness.

- ➤ South Hills Interfaith Movement provides care coordination and vital services to prevent families from facing financial and/or housing crises.
- ► The Salvation Army guides families through structured, goalsetting programs that focus on their individual strengths and leads to more stable situations.
- ▶ Tickets for Kids provides children experiencing homelessness and living in shelters with the same cultural events and activities enjoyed by their more affluent peers.
- ▶ Women's Center & Shelter helps families with children meet their basic needs by providing resources, advocacy, and counseling to facilitate healing for child victims of intimate partner violence.

For nearly a decade, PCGF has dedicated its resources to mitigating the circumstances of families with children who are experiencing homelessness. In an effort to increase direct support to children and to encourage social and emotional development, the Foundation will announce changes to its area of emphasis early next year.
