## 23 Community Partners Receive Grants

During the annual meeting in November, Trustees voted to award grants to the following organizations that serve those who are experiencing or are at risk of homelessness.

- ▶ Allegheny Valley Association of Churches works to keep families with children together as they transition from homelessness or housing instability by providing shelter, meals, case management, and support that will lead to self-sufficiency.
- ► Allies for Health + Wellbeing provides support for clients living



with HIV/AIDS and their children to prevent them from becoming homeless.

- ▶ Angels' Place implements holistic programs for single parents and their children up to age 5 to create stability and reduce the likelihood that they will become homeless.
- ▶ **Bethlehem Haven** provides short-term solutions to avoid long-term poverty by keeping families in their homes and out of the shelter system.
- ▶ **Beverly's Birthdays**, believing that all children are worth celebrating, provides birthday cheer

in shelters for children experiencing homelessness.

#### **▶** Big Brothers Big Sisters

provides guidance and educational opportunities to high school students experiencing homelessness through one-on-one mentorship and post-secondary preparation classes.

- ▶ **Bridge to the Mountains** provides safe, emergency shelter to families with children who would otherwise be living on the streets.
- ▶ Catapult provides opportunity, education, and support for single, young parents with children under the age of three to help them achieve self-sufficiency.
- ▶ Duquesne University School of Nursing presented a symposium on the Impact of Social Isolation on vulnerable populations.
- ▶ East End Cooperative Ministry provides enriching experience and diversionary activities during out-of-school time that enable children to see a brighter future.
- ► **Familylinks** provides critical financial assistance to families

experiencing homelessness, transitioning to temporary or new permanent housing, or who are in imminent danger of homelessness.

- ➤ **Goodwill of Southwestern PA** works to prevent homelessness or decrease the time spent as homeless by providing supportive housing to families with children.
- ► Homeless Children's Education Fund acquires supplies for Winnie's Wagon, a mobile unit that provides

services for hard-to-reach homeless children who may not be staying in shelters or attending formal school regularly.

- ► **Jeremiah's Place** provides free emergency childcare for children ages 0 to 6.
- ► **Light of Life** works to prevent homelessness and provide stability in the lives of women with children by providing a continuum of care.

- ▶ RAND provides objective research and analysis that helps develop solutions to public policy challenges to make communities safer, healthier, and more prosperous.
- ► Serenity Living Transitional Home works to prevent homelessness in youth and young adults by providing transitional housing and supportive services to those who were homeless.
- ➤ **Sisters Place** provides residential clients with basic needs so they can focus on recovery from addiction, financial stability, employment, and education.
- ➤ **Sojourner House** works to support mothers in recovery by keeping families together by providing a safe haven to help keep them from slipping back into homelessness.
- ▶ South Hills Interfaith Movement provides service coordination and vital support to prevent families from facing financial and/or housing crises.



Tickets for Kids enables children experiencing homelessness and living in shelters to enjoy cultural events and activities.

- ▶ The Salvation Army guides families through structured, goalsetting programs that focus on their individual strengths and gain stability in their lives.
- ➤ Tickets for Kids provides children experiencing homelessness and living in shelters with the same cultural events and activities

enjoyed by their more affluent peers.

► Women's Center & Shelter helps families with children meet their basic needs by providing resources, advocacy and counseling to facilitate healing for child victims of intimate partner violence. •



## **Low-Barrier Homeless Shelter Opens**

Second Avenue Commons, a new low-barrier shelter, opened in late November to serve people experiencing homelessness. The facility has 96 beds with capacity for an additional 30 beds, if needed, and includes a primary care clinic and a day program that provides support services for walk-in clients. Pittsburgh Mercy, Pittsburgh Mercy Operation Safety Net, and UPMC are among the partners providing services at the facility.
