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Presentations Focus on Helping Homeless Individuals

In June, three presentations addressed various issues concerning people experiencing homelessness.

RAND Pittsburgh hosted a community discussion of research and strategies to prevent homelessness among youth, families and military veterans. **Dr. Natasha Slesnick** of Ohio State University, **Dr. Ann Elizabeth Montgomery** of the University of Alabama, Birmingham, and **Deborah Linhart**, CEO of Bethlehem Haven, took part in the conversation.

The June PCGF Board meeting featured two presentations. **Dr. Karen Shephard**, Executive Director of PACE School, and **Abby Horn**, Senior Advisor for the Allegheny County Department of Human Services, addressed the Board of Trustees and Advisory Committee concerning Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), trauma informed care and Allegheny County's plan to make homelessness a rare and brief occurrence and non-reoccurring by 2022.

As is well-documented, the root causes of homelessness are varied and often layered. Content shared during the three June presentations included:

- **Runaways** Many homeless youth begin as runaways.
- Abandoned Structure "Homes"
 - Only 10% of youth experiencing homelessness access services designed to help them; most live on their own in abandoned structures.
- Shelter Avoidance Afraid of being sent home or into foster care, youth refrain from accessing shelters or other services that can prevent chronic homelessness.
- Female Vets Females compose the fastest-growing population of veterans experiencing homelessness.
- **Seniors** Within the next 10 years, 30% of Allegheny County's population age 65+ will be at risk of homelessness.

Information pertaining to prevention and intervention initiatives included:

- Trauma Informed Care Hallmarks of this approach include safety, transparency and trustworthiness, empowerment, choice, peer support and mutual self-help.
- Blended Services A combination of school-based prevention, familybased services and a continuum of care can help prevent chronic homelessness in youth.

- ESSA Designation Partnering with schools to support the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) enables children who are homeless to receive protection of federal law.
- Medical Care Bethlehem Haven developed a two-year pilot with Allegheny Health Network to house individuals who need medical care. Through this medical respite program, 85% of participants were able to fully complete their course of medical treatment. Bethlehem Haven has recently opened a 29-bed program to continue these efforts.

As well, National Network for Youth (NN4Y) is urging Congress to reauthorize \$85 million for the Education for Homeless Children and Youth program, which removes barriers to enrollment, attendance and opportunity for success for homeless children and youth.
