DHS Director Marc Cherna Retires

Armest congratulations to
Marc Cherna on his retirement in March as Director of the Allegheny County Department of Human Services. Hired 25 years ago "to fix child welfare, we were known as a national disgrace," as he explains, Mr. Cherna went on to establish the Department of Human Services (DHS), bringing together four separate departments into one entity. His focus on prevention, service delivery and public-private partnerships has

resulted in the creation of numerous initiatives including the 412 Youth Zone (a drop-in center for youth aging out of foster care or experiencing homelessness) and the forthcoming year-round, low-barrier shelter for fragile populations.

Under Mr. Cherna's leadership, DHS has won national recognition from the Harvard Kennedy School of Government, Casey Family Programs

PCGF at Work in the Community

Since 2014, the Foundation has focused its resources on mitigating the circumstances of families with children and youth who are experiencing homelessness. PCGF collaborates with direct service providers, the Department of Human Services and other foundations to address this issue. The pandemic of 2020 compounded challenges for both marginalized families as well as cash-strapped service providers. We appreciate the work of our community partners in significantly impacting the community.

Highlights from programs implemented in 2020 with PCGF support included:

Allegheny Valley Association of Churches assisted 24 families, including 16 children.

The agency works to bring stability to families that leads to permanent housing and self-sufficiency by providing basic necessities and case management to families with children who are experiencing homelessness. AVAC acquired Chromebooks and assisted children in attending school virtually.

Angels' Place served 104 clients by providing early childhood education and support to improve options for housing stabilization.

Angels' Place addresses the issue of generational poverty by providing assistance to single parents with children age birth to 5.

Bethlehem Haven's Safe at Home program served families by providing monetary support to prevent families with children from becoming homeless or to put them in rapid housing programs. During the pandemic, Bethlehem Haven received more than 2,000 calls for assistance, representing a 40% increase over the prior year.

Beverly's Birthdays played a pivotal role in bringing a sense of normalcy to children during the pandemic as the organization **provided** birthday parties, gifts and cheer to 182 children who are receiving services from various agencies.

Bridge to the Mountains street outreach program provides emergency shelter to pregnant women and women with children who are experiencing sudden homelessness and are at risk of family separation. Four children were born to women while living in the facility.



East End Cooperative Ministry launched a new program to help families achieve independence through housing and **served 70 families.**

HEARTH provides housing and supportive services to women with children fleeing domestic violence and other traumas and **continued to offer life-changing programs** throughout 2020.

153 youth in summer and after school
programs in four shelters. ▶

Jeremiah's Place was forced to alter plans because of the mandate to limit gatherings. Rather than scheduling face-to-face meetings and tours, Jeremiah's Place continued to work virtually with its 30 partner agencies and provided parents with clothing, shoes, cleaning supplies and food in 250 grab-and-go bags.

Light of Life Rescue Mission used its PCGF grant to support two components, Women's
Street Outreach and the Family Shelter, and this support was used to avoid evictions, get families

into homes, provide transportation assistance, purchase clothing and enable participants to enroll in school or cover expenses of applying for employment.

Serenity Living Transitional Home, which assists youth between the ages of 13 and 23, provided a safe place to live and taught life skills. Because of the pandemic, many SLTH residents lost employment but funding enabled the organization to provide uninterrupted service.

Sojourner House MOMS (Motivation Opportunities Mentoring Spirituality) served 19 women who were experiencing homelessness and in recovery. In response to the pandemic, staff adjusted programs by monitoring the mental health of clients, teaching virtual etiquette protocols, monitoring homeschooling and obtaining masks and hand sanitizers for clients.

South Hills Interfaith Movement meets the growing demands of individuals and families searching for critical services in the South Hills area. SHIM experienced a 21% increase in requests for support this past year and helped to feed 2,000 individuals a month through its pantry. Case management helped clients navigate the complex system of social services.

The Salvation Army's Pathways of Hope program provided intensive case management to prevent street and other forms of homelessness by offering quality case management, clinical assessments and one-on-one counseling sessions.

Tickets for Kids quickly pivoted to online programs for much needed diversionary activities and through its partnerships **provided 391 virtual experiences.** ▼



Trade Institute of Pittsburgh partnered with shelters and the Allegheny County Jail to present program training and employment in the trades with the goal of breaking down gender barriers and encouraging women to train and pursue well paying, nontraditional careers.

Women's Center & Shelter provided services to 297 children and their mothers who were fleeing domestic violence situations. 100% of the children were linked to medical, dental and developmental screenings; 81% of schoolage children who stayed in shelter for 5+ days maintained school attendance while school was in session.

South Hills Interfaith Movement food pantry
